

- Row 1: 17 (top-left), 21 (top), 14 (top), 34 (top), 20 (top-right)
- Row 2: 10 (left), 23 (right), 6 (bottom-left)
- Row 3: 33 (left), 33 (right)
- Row 4: 17 (top-left), 8 (bottom-left), 14 (top), 8 (bottom-left), 7 (bottom-right), 7 (right)
- Row 5: 17 (top-left), 5 (left), 6 (top), 10 (right), 20 (top-right), 10 (bottom-left), 3 (bottom), 17 (right)
- Row 6: 36 (left), 36 (right)
- Row 7: 17 (left), 9 (top), 17 (left), 9 (right), 9 (right)
- Row 8: 17 (bottom-left), 21 (bottom), 3 (bottom), 34 (bottom), 17 (bottom-right)

- Row 3: 25 (left), 25 (right)
- Row 4: 9 (bottom-left), 4 (top), 11 (right), 12 (bottom-left), 11 (bottom-right), 12 (right)
- Row 5: 10 (top-left), 10 (right), 19 (top-right), 10 (bottom-left), 4 (bottom), 3 (right)
- Row 6: 27 (left), 27 (right)
- Row 7: 17 (left), 28 (top), 17 (left), 10 (top), 3 (right), 3 (right)
- Row 8: 17 (bottom-left), 12 (bottom), 4 (bottom), 3 (bottom-right)
